### A Note from the Chairman

Teamwork. determination and momentum are a beautiful thing! A safe, clean and caring home for underprivileged kids undergoing cancer treatment, had been on our hearts and minds since we. as Round Table, Meikles Foundation and Kidzcan decided to come together many years ago to form Rainbow Children's Village. We had the property and the vision, and after spending a number of years jumping through all the necessary hoops to achieve our official PVO registration, which would allow us to begin fundraising, we set out on our ambitious task of raising the large sum of funds required for the construction of this village. In the process we were very kindly assisted with training and support from ALSAC in the USA on how to fundraise on this scale.

We finished last year with a big bang, marked by the launch and opening of Rainbow Children's Village phase 1 - the administration and catering block along with 5 rooms - a great effort by all those involved in meeting this deadline.

We broke ground in October 2021 with a lot of faith in the bank, a few dollars and some generous pledges from a number of kind donors and dedicated construction team who believed in the project as much as we did. John Manning and his team of faithful men, including contractor Lues Construction set about their work with determination. Our thanks must go to Brett Lues and his team for sticking with the project and at times helping to bridge the gaps, when funding was slow to come through.

Sadly, we said goodbye to Chelsea Evans who stepped down from the board after putting in a lot of hard work as secretary and in marketing, as well as heading up fundraising for a period. We look forward her continued support at RCV.2022 saw us expand our board from 9 to 11 member, to complete and formalize our final board structure, providing an equal representation by all stakeholders (3 from each sponsor member plus independent representatives from legal and medical professions).In doing welcomed Chester Naik,

Unaiswi Nyikadzino and Gary Cross.

Having crested the peak of phase I of the RCV project and now in a position of having opened our doors to the children and parents alike, we are now faced with the remaining two peaks to mountaineer up! These being raising funds to construct phase 2 (II rooms) and phase 3 (II rooms) to bring our total accommodation facilities to 27 rooms.

As the board of RCV we are hugely grateful for the astute leadership and enormous effort by Lara Botha, who has taken a break from her career and professional committed her time and efforts to drive the fundraising charge up the mountain. All our combined efforts would yield no fruit if it were not for the generosity of those who have taken the time to deeply consider difference that Children's Village will have on the young lives that we are reaching out to touch. Your donations, however big or small, have made and will make all the difference - we are so truly grateful.

The advent of HIV & AIDS which devastated the world and became the new 'hush-hush' stigmatised disease to talk about, education on preventative measures, early screening, regular medical checkups, vaccines, research, modern medicine and the will of people to assist has definitely impacted and contributed to more open dialogue.

However, there are still pockets around the world where people, particularly children are dying unnecessarily from cancer. Hence, when the opportunity arose for Meikles Foundation to partner with Round Table & KidzCan to answer the need in assisting disadvantaged children with their recuperation of their cancer treatment which could contribute to them continuing their treatment and thereby increasing the mortality rate of children diagnosed with cancer it was a no-brainer, to coin a phrase.

The vision to create and provide a nurturing oasis, these disadvantaged children need to recuperate in, is at the core of Meikles Foundation. KidzCan Zimbabwe's love for children continues to grow and has fully embraced the World Health Organisation (WHO) Global Initiative on Childhood Cancer (GICC) to increase the survival rate of children suffering from cancer to 60% by year 2030.

Currently the survival rate in low-to-medium income countries including Zimbabwe is around 20% while by contrast, at 80% in the developed world.


As part of home-grown solutions to the challenges the Rainbow Children's Village (RCV) becomes a panacea to the child and caregiver by aiding the palliative process as it will take care of the so many discomforts that have in the past caused abandonment of treatment.

It solves travel issues by cutting bus fare trips and costs through the provision of a home-away-from - home that creates an environment that boosts the morale of the child suffering from cancer.


The halfway house also takes care of the nutritional demands of the children as they recuperate in time for the next cycle of treatment and will provide teachings on life skills like gardening while on site.

Bringing relief to a forgotten part of the world is what the RCV will do, and we implore everyone to join hands with us by becoming part of this worthy project.

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
